Title	Promoting as third sector, CSO/NGO are united in Bangladesh Accountability and Localization for Humanitarianism and Development with Positive Engagement
Objectives	After a yearlong country wide process of sensitization and discussion on the discourses of Development Effective (DE), Principles of Partnership (PoP), Charter for Change (C4C) and Grand Bargain (GB) commitments with civil society of Bangladesh, this National Convention of local CSO/ NGO will be held to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (i) Declare a CSO/NGO self-accountability charter, (ii) Announce a CSO/ NGO charter of expectations from government and partners (INGOs and donors) and solicit their support to grow as a sovereign and sustainable sector, (iii) Promote positive engagement, cooperation and coordination across the sector especially with the government, and (iv) Support government plan to achieve SDG, vision 2021 and Bangladesh Delta 2100

Background	<p>Principles of Partnership (PoP) was announced in 2007 and signed by around 40 organizations including International Red Cross, INGOs and World Bank after a worldwide discussion. Charter for Change (C4C) was announced in 2015 and signed by around 40 globally prominent INGOs and endorsed by more than 150 national and local NGOs. The milestone commitment was agreed and announced as Grand Bargain (GB) during World Humanitarian Summit (WHS), May 2016 in Istanbul, Turkey. Almost all major donor countries, UN agencies and INGO networks have signed the GB commitments, which is the first declaration with measurable 51 indicators under 10 workstreams primarily towards localization, transparency and participation revolution.</p> <p>There is another global discourse called Development Effectiveness has been officially declared and in operation being recognized by the state parties along with UN agencies and multilateral financial institutions like World Bank. Through a long consultation process with milestones of Monterrey Consensus (2002), Paris Declaration on Aid Effectiveness (2005), Accra Agenda for Development Effectiveness (2008), Busan Partnership for Effective Development Cooperation (2011) and at the latest in Nairobi Declaration for Development Effectiveness (2016) it came up with an official global body to guide the global development titled Global Platform on Effective Development Cooperation (GPEDC). The body promotes cooperation among the state parties, private sectors and the civil society at the global forum. Finance Minister of Bangladesh, Germany and Uganda are the co-chairs of the GPEDC. The process has accepted civil society as the equal actor of development.</p> <p>Nowadays political sociologists consider state as the first, private sector or market as the second and civil society or NGO as the third sector within the state to contribute to the development process.</p> <p>Bangladeshi CSO/NGOs always have been proactive in participating to all those discourses. Continuing with all the process and discourses a country-wide sensitization campaign among the CSO/ NGOs during 2016-2019 took place in 8 divisions and 24 districts having three specific outcomes as:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (i) Self-Accountability towards the affected population alongside the government and donors;

	<p>(ii) Expectations of the local CSO/ NGOs from the government and development partners (INGOs and donors);</p> <p>(iii) How to continue with the positive engagement, cooperation and coordination with government.</p> <p>This National Convention is going to be the final culmination of presenting those in front of key policy leaders from national and international level and also to pledge how as CSO/NGO to be accountable and to contribute in country's commitment to achieve SDG, vision 2021 and Bangladesh Delta 2100.</p>
Participants with categories	<p>At least 5 NGO / CSO leader from each of the 64 districts based on criteria, especially who are active and with probability to be active on sustainable basis, committed to the pro poor humanitarianism and development, non-partisan, with fair image and influencing characters, will be selected through bottom up participatory process and will be invited to participate in the conference.</p> <p>District participants 320, small grass root MFI 50 (with their own support), Dhaka based NGO leaders 50, Guest from UN agencies, INGOs and high officials 75, plus 50 conference management volunteers, all total 545.</p>
